Item No. 1	<p>Approval of the Action Taken Report of the previous Governing body Meeting.</p> <p>The Action Taken Report on the decisions and resolutions of the 25th Governing body Meeting held on 20th December 2025 was presented before the members.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The suggestions and recommendations made during the 25th Governing body meeting with regard to the Start-up Policy and Full Semester Internship Policy have been duly incorporated and implemented by the institution. <p>The Start-up and Full Semester Internship policy enclosed as Annexure – 1.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The institution effectively implemented initiatives for the development and enhancement of faculty e-content to support innovative and technology-enabled learning. <p>Faculty wise e-content list enclosed as Annexure - 2</p> <p>Resolution: The Members approved the Action Taken Report on the 25th Governing body Meeting held on 20th December 2025.</p>

Item No. 2	<p>Consideration and approval of in-house internship programs through Centers of Excellence at the Institute.</p> <p>The principal presented the Governing Body with details regarding 10 Summer Internship Programs organized under various Centres of Excellence at MLRITM, scheduled from 11 May 2026 to 30 May 2026. He stated that these programs aim to enhance students' technical knowledge, practical exposure, and industry y-oriented skills through hands-on training in emerging technologies. He further informed the body that 330 students have registered across the various institutions and that detailed information regarding the internships and registrations has been made available on the institutional website at https://summer-internships.mlritm.ac.in/.</p> <p>The detailed policy document and student registration details are enclosed as Annexure - 3.</p> <p>Resolution: The Governing body considered and approved the proposal for conducting in-house internship programs through the Centers of Excellence, noting their alignment with NEP 2020 and industry-readiness objectives.</p>
Item No. 3	<p>Consideration and approval for the Proposal to add 40 kW to the Existing Rooftop Solar Plant, including budget allocation and implementation.</p> <p>The principal informed the Governing body that the institution has proposed the procurement and installation of an additional 40 kW rooftop solar power plant, thereby increasing the total installed solar power generation capacity from 160 kWp to 200 kWp. He stated that the proposed expansion</p>

	<p>aims to reduce dependence on conventional grid power, enhance energy efficiency, and promote sustainable energy practices on campus. The approximate budget for the proposed installation, including a dedicated solar inverter for the additional 40 kWp capacity is ₹14,00,000/-.</p> <p>Resolution: The Governing body approved the proposal to expand the rooftop solar plant capacity by 40 kW and sanctioned the required budget allocation for implementation.</p>
Item No. 4	<p>Consideration and approval for allocation/release of ₹50 lakhs per annum as funding support for Student/Institution Start-ups.</p> <p>The principal presented a proposal seeking the Governing body's approval for the allocation and release of a dedicated fund of ₹ 50,00,000/- (Fifty Lakhs Only) per annum to support student and institution-led start-ups. He explained that the fund would be disbursed through the Institution's Innovation Council (IIC) and the established Section 8 Company through MLRS Innovation & Start-up Foundation U85499TS2025NPL205299 in accordance with the approved Start-up Policy. The disbursement framework, eligibility criteria, evaluation mechanism, and Utilization guidelines have been drawn up in conformity with applicable regulatory and accounting norms.</p> <p>The detailed proposal is enclosed as Annexure – 4.</p> <p>Resolution: The Governing body approved the allocation and release of Rs. 50,00,000/- (Rupees Fifty Lakhs Only) as dedicated funding support for student and institutional start-ups, to be disbursed through the IIC in accordance with the approved Start-up Policy.</p>
Item No. 5	<p>Consideration and approval of budget utilization for F.Y. 2025-26 and proposed budget for F.Y. 2026-27.</p> <p>The principal, along with the Finance Committee, presented a detailed statement of budget utilization for the Financial Year 2025–26, covering income and expenditure across all academic, infrastructural, and administrative heads. He also presented the proposed budget for the Financial Year 2026–27, outlining key priority areas including faculty development, laboratory infrastructure, research funding, digital initiatives, and maintenance. The Board was informed that the proposed budget has been formulated after due deliberation by the Finance Committee and is consistent with the institution's strategic objectives.</p> <p>The detailed budget documents are enclosed as Annexure - 5.</p> <p>Resolution: The Governing body approved the budget utilization report for FY 2025-26 and the proposed budget for FY 2026–27, subject to periodic monitoring and review by the Finance Committee.</p>
Item No. 6	<p>Consideration and approval of establishment of Centre of Excellence in CISCO and NVIDIA.</p> <p>The principal presented proposals for the establishment of two collaborative Centres of Excellence in association with CISCO and NVIDIA. He explained that the CISCO Centre of Excellence will focus on networking technologies, cybersecurity, and cloud infrastructure, while the NVIDIA Centre of Excellence will emphasize artificial intelligence, GPU computing, deep learning, and advanced data science applications. He further stated that both centres are intended to provide students and faculty with access to advanced tools, industry certifications, and collaborative research opportunities. The approximate budget proposed for the NVIDIA Centre of Excellence is ₹21,24,000/-, while the CISCO Centre of Excellence is estimated at ₹6,93,132/-.</p> <p>Resolution: The Governing body approved the establishment of Centers of Excellence in CISCO and NVIDIA, recognizing their potential to significantly enhance the institution's technological capabilities and industry linkages.</p>

Item No. 7	<p>Consideration and approval of establishment of Centre of Excellence in Ultra Tech, Deep Tech – Fintech.</p> <p>The principal presented proposals for the establishment of two separate Centres of Excellence: The UltraTech Centre of Excellence and the Deep Tech – FinTech Centre of Excellence. He explained that the UltraTech Centre of Excellence would focus on advanced construction technologies, sustainable building practices, and industry-oriented training in civil engineering applications. Further, he stated that the Deep Tech – FinTech Centre of Excellence would aim to provide students and faculty with expertise in emerging financial technologies, blockchain, AI-driven financial systems, and digital payment ecosystems. He elaborated that both centres would function in collaboration with leading industry partners, offering skill-based certifications, live project exposure, research opportunities, and incubation support in their respective domains.</p> <p>The detailed proposal is enclosed as Annexure - 6.</p> <p>Resolution: The Governing body approved the establishment of the Centre of Excellence in Ultra Tech and Deep Tech – Fintech, noting its relevance to emerging industry demands and its contribution to student employability.</p>																		
Item No. 8	<p>Consideration and approval of establishment of Centre of Excellence in Micro-Chip Technology.</p> <p>The principal presented a proposal for the establishment of a Centre of Excellence in Micro-Chip Technology, in alignment with India's national semiconductor mission and the growing importance of chip design and embedded systems in the global technology landscape. He elaborated that the centre will offer hands-on training in VLSI design, chip architecture, and embedded programming, and will serve as a platform for collaborative research with industry and academic partners. The approximate budget proposed for the Micro-chip Centre of Excellence is ₹5,00,000/-.</p> <p>Resolution:</p> <p>The Governing body approved the establishment of the Centre of Excellence in Micro-Chip Technology, appreciating its strategic importance in line with national semiconductor policy and institutional academic goals.</p>																		
Item No. 9	<p>Consideration and approval of Scholarship Disbursements and Student Beneficiary List for the Academic Year 2025–26.</p> <p>The principal presented before the Governing body the consolidated list of students identified as eligible beneficiaries for various institutional scholarship categories applicable for the Academic Year 2025–26, as defined in the institution's scholarship policy. Item No. 11	<p>Consideration and approval of Revised Internship Policy and R&D Policy. The principal presented the revised versions of the Internship Policy and the Research and Development (R&D) Policy, incorporating feedback from the 25th Governing body and aligning them with updated regulatory frameworks and institutional objectives. The revised Internship Policy includes detailed provisions for in-house internships through Centers of Excellence, evaluation norms, and credit equivalence. The revised R&D Policy incorporates enhanced seed funding guidelines, research ethics compliance mechanisms, and faculty incentive revisions. The revised policy documents are enclosed as Annexure - 8.</p> <p>Resolution: The Governing body approved the Revised Internship Policy and R&D Policy as presented.</p>
Item No. 12	<p>Consideration and Approval for organizing Outcome-Based Education (OBE) Workshop scheduled in June 2026. The principal proposed the conduct of an Outcome-Based Education (OBE) Workshop scheduled in June 2026 in collaboration with National Institute of Technical Teachers Training and Research Chennai (NITTTR Chennai). The workshop is intended to sensitize faculty members on effective curriculum design, attainment computation, and continuous quality improvement practices aligned with the latest NBA accreditation requirements, including WKs (Knowledge Profiles) and ECs (Engineering Competencies/Attributes). He explained that the programme will be facilitated by external OBE experts and resource persons from NITTTR Chennai, and will include hands-on sessions on CO-PO mapping, attainment analysis, documentation practices, and action plan formulation for continuous improvement.</p> <p>Resolution: The Governing body approved to conduct of the OBE Workshop in June 2026 and authorized the necessary arrangements and budget allocation for the same.</p>
Item No. 13	<p>Consideration and Approval for ISO Audit Process and Readiness Status. The principal briefed the Governing body on the current status of the ISO certification process initiated pursuant to the approval granted in the 25th Governing body meeting. He informed that the institution has completed the gap analysis phase for both ISO 21001:2018 (EOMS) and ISO 9001:2015 (QMS), and that the documentation and process alignment are progressing as per the implementation schedule. The internal audit process has been initiated, and the external audit is planned in the forthcoming months</p> <p>Resolution: The Governing body noted the progress of the ISO Audit process and approved the continuation of the certification roadmap as presented.</p>


Suggestions Made by the Committee Members:
